



Mr. Wynn Allen Rostek

February 14, 1956 - October 10, 2019

Wynn Allen Rostek, beloved husband, stepfather, brother, uncle and friend, died Oct. 10 at home in Titusville after a long illness. With his quick wit, brilliant mind, generosity and gentle spirit, Wynn was a remarkable man who will be greatly missed.

Born Feb. 14, 1956, in Decatur, Ill., he was the son of Wallace (Wally) and Shirley Rostek. The family moved to Titusville in 1960. Wynn graduated from Astronaut High School in 1974. He earned two associate degrees before receiving a bachelor degree in Computer Science from the University of Central Florida. A lifelong learner, Wynn returned to school in his late 40s to earn a degree in Technical Management from DeVry University.

His career in aerospace and defense spanned four decades. As a software engineer, Wynn was an expert in embedded systems and communications. He served as principal engineer of Sentry View Systems of Melbourne before illness forced his early retirement.

American Mensa recently honored him for his many years of service to the organization.

In addition to computers and electronics, Wynn's many interests included amateur radio, photography, writing, traveling and nature. The Everglades and the Smoky Mountains were his favorite travel destinations. Nothing gave Wynn greater joy than spending time at the family cabin in the North Carolina mountains.

He was a member of the Unitarian Universalist Fellowship of Central Brevard.

He is survived by his wife, Suzanne; stepson Kurt Penca of Cocoa; stepdaughter Gabrielle Diekmann and son-in-law Jared Diekmann of Durham, N.C.; sisters Linda Rostek of Mims and Jill Belflower of Thomasville, Ga.; nephews Jay Grunenfelder of Titusville and Rusty Edwards of Atlanta, Ga.; niece Amber Owens of Thomasville, Ga; numerous cousins including Karen Ogden of Titusville; two grandnephews (Evin Thomas and Cooper Graves) and three grandnieces (Jaylynn Grunenfelder, Savanna Owens, and Hayden Graves).

“ As Wynn's sister, I have many, many memories and every single one is a treasure. Just to show the depth of kindness, concern and compassion my brother was made of; even as he battled through the many difficult and often painful medical and physical issues he faced, his thoughts and concerns were for the well being of those around him, not for himself. Just days before we lost him I was having great difficulty with the arthritis in my hips. When I picked him up from dialysis and got him home, his concern was for me. When I disappeared into their garage and was gone for 15 minutes he called me on my cell, afraid I had fallen or hurt myself or simply couldn't walk back from the garage into the house because I'd been limping so badly. I could hear the deep concern in his sweet gentle voice. He wouldn't hang up on the call till I was standing next to him and he could see I was okay. He was always so gracious; thanking me profusely for every single thing I did, no matter how small, from picking him up from dialysis, covering him with a blanket, fixing him lunch, getting him ice, taking off his shoes, sweeping up crumbs, it didn't matter what it was, he was appreciative and he truly meant it. In these past few days I've had the pleasure of hearing from others about how they too were touched by this kind, gentle, intelligent, compassionate and caring man - my big brother, whom I shall love till the end of eternity.
